OLD ALFREDIAN AND TURNER PRIZE WINNER ANTHONY MEACOCK VISITS DT

Old Alfredian Anthony Meacock, who graduated from KAS in 2005 and went on to study architecture at the University of Cambridge, is part of the Assemble Collective, winners of this year's Turner Prize. Assemble is a collective of artists, designers and architects. One of their best known projects was the regeneration of a derelict section of Liverpool, The Granby Four Streets. Anthony spoke to Sixth Form DT students about his current work and how his time at KAS influenced his philosophy and approach to design. He toured the school grounds and visited his old haunts. He recalled helping to build the tree house, which still stands today though without the very high crow's nest they initially installed all those years ago.

EDWIN SAVITT 1920-2015 "My father, Edwin Savitt, who was a very committed KAS parent throughout the late

1950's and 60's and into the 70's, died last summer. My sister, Andrea and I, entered KAS in 1958, leaving around 1970. Our father, Eddie, as he was better known, formed a close personal friendship with Sir Alan Wood who then became President of KASS and together, over a period of 17 years, spent a great deal of time helping to raise much needed funds for the school. He was a keen supporter of the ethos and forged close relationships with the teachers. Eddie served on Council for 17 years and worked tirelessly to help the school through difficult financial times by way of personal fundraising as well as contributing to the school's approach to education and society as a whole." - Jonathan Savitt, father of Alexander (KAS pupil 1990-2005)
