Y6 teacher Adele said: "The children were engrossed in her stories about hearing gunfire and wearing body armour. We had a great discussion about the complexities of war, helping us to kick-start our inquiry topic of Peace and War."

Maisie: "Salima told us she had to wear bulletproof clothing to protect her. I found that really scary."

Alfie: "Salima said she was very far away but the sound of the fighting was still very loud and in the night she could see gunfire - that sounded particularly scary."

ROBERT AND KAREN'S MESSAGE

Now that we're halfway through this half term, one question on everyone's mind is the likely date of the return to the school site. At the moment it's not possible to give a very good answer. What we can say is that it will depend on the level of cases in London and the south east and the subsequent pressures on the NHS. We went into lockdown as cases rocketed in December from around 150 per 100000 to over 1000 per



100000. Lockdown for schools will only end when the numbers fall back to previous levels and that is going to rest on what happens with any new variants and the extent to which lockdown rules are respected. We've been told this week that schools will be 'the last to shut and the first to open', that they may open at different times in different regions, and that there will be two weeks' notice for any change. As soon as we know more, we will pass this on, and in the meantime, we'll continue to make KASConnected learning the very best experience that we can.
