What I like most about teaching is working with young people. You are all so positive and the atmosphere in the classroom is very fun. I would hate to be in an office all day.



They have been inspired by the WW1 poets and created their own versions imagining what life would be like on the frontline.




DOING IT FOR THE KIDS




CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH WEEK
