# **ABSTRACT OUTFITS**

Year 9 students took a day off timetable to fully immerse themselves in a creative project with the Art Department.

Teacher Nic explained to us how the project worked. "We started by looking at examples of famous abstract artists and we talked about the themes we saw there. There were lots of bold colours, strong geometric shapes and straight lines. We wanted the students to take those ideas and create three dimensional, wearable sculptures so we also looked at some fashion designers for inspiration."

Students spent the first session sketching their ideas and expanding on the elements of the inspiration materials they most liked. Then in groups they picked the best elements and got to work making their two dimensional drawings into three dimensional reality.

Nic explained why the project is useful to the students, saying: "They are trying things out and learning as they are doing and transposing their ideas from one medium to another and it all comes together in a quite unusual and beautiful way."

## **KAS 125**

THE KAS SOCIETY LOGO DESIGNED BY CHARLES F.A. VOYSEY (1857-1941)

#### Another date to celebrate in this 125th year!

In February 1898 the Arts and Crafts designer and architect, Charles Voysey, one of our first parents, delivered the design for the logo of the Society. We have lived with this beautiful logo for the Society ever since but how often have we looked at the detail of it?



Happily Voysey left a note describing the ideas behind the design. Central is the tree of good and evil springing out of the heart. He depicted Alfred with details drawn from early manuscripts, notably in a crown copied from an image of the later King, Edgar. On the King's left is a monogram taken from a coin minted in 880<sub>AD</sub> in Alfred's reign. The monogram is formed by the letters of Londonia (London).




On the reverse of the coin there is an image of Alfred in profile and around it the letters AELFRED RE. Voysey used some of the lettering in the logo from the coin but strangely not all of it. The L is missing and the F is not fully formed. That's a little mystery.

## A non-religious, secular school?

King Alfred is holding The Bible in his right hand indicating Proverbs chapter 2 verse 6 which reads "For the Lord giveth wisdom: out of his mouth cometh knowledge and understanding". How odd to find a Bible quote in the logo of a school whose founders were so intent that no religion be taught to their children. Another mystery.

What is true is that Alfred was an ardent Christian, known for his zeal and ability to convert Vikings to Christianity. His other great passion was education and learning, which is why the founders had chosen to name the School after him, not least because he educated his daughters as well as his sons.

Perhaps we need to look more closely at Charles Voysey himself. He was not one of the seven founders but enrolled his children at the School from the earliest days.



Charles was the son of a Church of England priest who had educated him. Interestingly his father had been dismissed because he disagreed with certain accepted beliefs, for example he refused to preach the church's doctrine on eternal damnation. He formed his own church, Theism, breaking free from the constraints of his previous role.



What did the founders think when they first saw the design, one wonders? There is no record of any dissent (that we have found yet!) but it is significant that the next design produced by Voysey for the school lacked any religious references. It was for a stained glass window for Ellerdale Road, the first School building. The V&A has this watercolour of the window design. No biblical quotes just the simple Latin motto 'ex corde vita' - 'out of the heart springs life'. We wonder whether the original window is still there. Who is going to knock on the door of number 24 and politely enquire?

The Voyseys remained a part of the School for many years. The eldest son, also called Charles, became an architect like his father. He was latterly called Charles Cowles Voysey as he took

his wife's surname as his own middle name upon marriage. It was this Charles Voysey who drew up plans for the School at Manor Wood, beautiful buildings that sadly had to be exchanged for used army huts when the move was made due to a severe lack of funds.

Charles F.A. Voysey is known to this day for the many beautiful and distinctive houses he designed. Have a look at Annesley House, 8 Platts Lane, Hampstead. He built this for his father and it is where his father, the erstwhile C of E priest, died.



### YEAR 8 DESIGN CHALLENGE

In Design Technology, Y8 have been creating exciting and innovative designs to encourage children under five to take their asthma medication. The design challenge is part of a competition organised by the University of Cambridge called <u>Designing Our Tomorrow</u>.

Students came up with loads of incredible design solutions to encourage children to carry their asthma spacer around with them. Some of our favourites included getting children to keep their spacers in a crocheted octopus bag, fabric pizza pouch, and rucksack designed with animal characters.







Elena worked on improving the experience by creating a system that rewards a child for taking a spacer. Every week a child carries their spacer with them, they earn a toy ghost from the 'ghostie family'.

DT teacher Miranda told us that the design challenge has focused less on practical skills and more on developing students' ability to "step into someone else's shoes and design with empathy" and consider the needs of lots of different clients in a single product, including the nurse, the child, the mother, and the grandmother.

## SOCIOLOGISTS PUTTING EDUCATION UP FOR DISCUSSION

Dr Tony Sewell CBE held a Zoom session with Year 13 Sociology pupils and a few Year 12s back in December. Dr Sewell is a renowned international education consultant, head of educational charity 'Generating Genius' and is also a life peer in the House of Lords.

Sociology teacher Nabiha told us, "Sewell makes numerous appearances in the A level Sociology textbook and has definitely gained 'celebrity status' amongst the students. They confidently engaged in a challenging discussion on the British education system, particularly the role of upbringing when it comes to educational achievement and the extent to which the system is meritocratic."

The gym was the location for a Year 9 careers speed dating event this term. There were 30 volunteers, most of whom were from our parent body, ready to talk about their profession to the students about to pick their Year 10 & 11 options.

### ASSESSMENT EVIDENCE

The King Alfred School and Rethinking
Assessment were making our voice heard
in Parliament again in January. The All
Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) on
Schools, Curriculum and Assessment, led
by Flick Drummond MP, had called
Rethinking Assessment to give evidence
on the impact of current assessment
methods on the curriculum schools are
able to offer. Deputy Head Al McConville
(who's hands can be seen circled in red in
the official photo!) presented on the
narrowing effect of government
accountability measures ('Progress 8' and



the 'EBACC') on the breadth of subjects schools can offer. He highlighted the horrible decline in creative subjects in particular. He told us: "KAS is happily exempt from these measures, which is why students are able to make such broad choices here, but in our quest to have an impact outside our gates we're working to open things up for other schools too. I told them about our School Directed Courses Consortium, which collaborates on alternative qualifications and whose members share the KAS emphasis on a 'broader definition of success'. Al added: "Robert and I had been making the same case the previous week in Draper's Hall in front of 250 school leaders, accompanied by a Year 10 Student, Hannah, who was canvassing views about the issues in education for her Global Challenges project. Our campaign goes on!"

Year 9 French students have been studying the tradition around 'La Chandeleur' (pancake day in France which took place on 2nd Feb) and how to make crêpes. 
