This was a wonderful opportunity to immerse themselves in the physical fieldwork element of what we have been studying in class since September and the subject was fully brought to life.




GREECE TRIP



TEN INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE FIRST HEAD OF KAS 1898

CHARLES E. RICE (1865-1949)

- 1. Charles wanted to be a doctor but became a teacher of science instead.
- 2. He taught at Bedales since it was founded in 1893.
- 3. He married Elsie Garrett just months before becoming Head at KAS in 1898.
- 4. Elsie had taught art at Bedales. Her sister taught music there and was married to the Head of Bedales, John Badley.
- 5. The sisters were orphaned very young and their cousin, the suffragist Millicent Garrett Fawcett, helped to raise them. Millicent agreed to officially open the School.
- 6. Charles and Elsie had two babies in the three years they were at KAS. So not much sleep.
- 7. They lived in Fitzjohn's Avenue. The School was nearby in Ellerdale Road.
- 8. Charles resigned in 1901 over a clash with the founders on the advisability of maintaining KAS as an all age school. Charles believed it wiser to restrict it to 14 years and under.
- 9. Charles and Elsie opened their own school, West Heath, in Frognal but returned to work at Bedales in 1908.
- 10. Charles later trained and qualified as the doctor he always wanted to be.

And let's add no.11 - Elsie left to live in South Africa, becoming a published illustrator there. She was joined by her daughter and her husband and their son was born there, the actor Nigel Hawthorne.

BRILLANTE BFI



APP ADVICE



It has recently become clear that an app called Zepeto has become popular amongst the Year 7 students, and we thought parents may appreciate a quick summary of what it is, so you can stay informed regarding the apps that the student body are using.

Zepeto is a social media app that allows you to create a 3D avatar and then communicate with people in an online environment. Due to the cartoonish and brightly coloured environments that your avatar interacts with, many parents and children may mistake Zepeto for a children's app/game, but the worlds are inhabited by adults. Depending on the settings used, children can interact with their friends only or with anyone on the app. It markets itself as part of the 'metaverse' and has been very popular in South East Asia, particularly Korea. As with most social media apps, materialism is highly encouraged and users are frequently prompted to make purchases using in-game currency, which can be earned through mini games or bought with real money. These games are designed with psychological hooks in mind to encourage users to return often to the app for fear of missing out on timed rewards. Zepeto also allows users to communicate with strangers all over the world, as well as send video and photo content to each other. This is no different to many other apps, but as always, presents a significant risk of children being contacted by strangers and the potential dangers this entails. Police in Scotland have already been made aware of one instance of a child being allegedly groomed on the app and have launched an investigation.

To be clear, Zepeto is not inherently more or less dangerous than any other social media app, but as always, parents should be aware of the potential dangers before deciding which apps their children should use. The age requirement for Zepeto is 13+, but Common Sense Media advise an age rating of 16+,
