KAS Boats Take on The Thames

On a very sunny Saturday in September, two of the KAS boats and a group of intrepid staff and students made their way to Canary Wharf to take part in the epic Great River Race.

The boats were designed and built at KAS as sailing boats, but with a sturdy set of oars (and the masts removed) they are eligible to take part in this marathon on water and have done for many years. Despite there being over 300 other fixed seat boats taking part, the only real competition that mattered was the one between the student and staff boat. After 22 miles, 28 bridges and a lot of sunny rowing, the students were victorious beating the staff by over 12 minutes.

We spoke to student Ale about the experience:

"I think part of being at KAS is being spontaneous and I love the joy that can come from doing unexpected things - I certainly didn't expect to be taking part in the Great River Race. I knew that in the moment it would be hard but that when I looked back on it I wouldn't remember the hard parts, I'd only remember the good parts of it."



Meera Syal Visit Brings Literature to Life

KAS Literature is a school directed course (SDC) which the School introduced this year as an alternative to the GCSE Literature qualification. The course includes a wider range of texts from far more varied cultures and time periods, and so we were excited to welcome Meera Syal to give a talk on her book, Anita and Me, to our Year 10 students.

One Year 10 student commented: "The talk from Meera Syal was so useful for my studies. The talk has definitely helped me enjoy the book; you can see it through her eyes and learn which parts she loved - it feels more sentimental."

Meera said: "I knew how I felt growing up not being able to find books that I could see myself in and not being represented. I wanted to stake our place in British history as we were never really commemorated; I didn't want us to just be a footnote."




snow falls on safety

Exploring San Sebastian

At the end of the Summer Term, 24 students embarked on the annual Spanish trip, accompanied by Ander, Nuray and Camilla, to enrich their Spanish language skills and explore the vibrant culture of San Sebastian.

The main goal was for students to improve Spanish fluency and cultural knowledge, and they did so through daily language courses, cultural activities and staying with local families. The trip wasn't all about studying, though! Our students had an amazing time catching waves during their surfing lessons, exploring the sites with a bike tour, experiencing a pintxos tour and savouring the flavours of Basque cuisine while learning about the art of tapas/pintxo preparation, visiting the local aquarium and exploring an island off the coast.

Lucy in Year 12 wrote about her own experiences of the trip:

"The freedom we had to explore helped me greatly strengthen my spoken Spanish; it allowed me to practice my fluency in a very fun and immersive way. It was truly an amazing trip and forms an integral part of my journey in the study of languages!"

Educational Outreach

KAS continues to work towards building a better educational landscape.

Over the past year, Deputy Head, Al McConville, has given evidence and attended meetings of the All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) on Schools, Curriculum and Assessment. The APPG recently launched a report which recommended Rethinking Assessment should develop a Learner Profile as an alternative to traditional school reports based on test scores. As members of Rethinking Assessment, KAS will continue to be involved in this work. You can read the report **here.**

We hosted a gathering of Big Education's Next Big 10 schools who shared their innovations and progress on their methodology for evidencing skills development. In the same week, we presented the KAS vision to an international group of leaders from different disciplines, showcasing how we're preparing our young people for the future.

As part of the School Directed Courses Consortium (SDCC) KAS representatives Liz, Camilla and Al recently met with 30+ like-minded schools to share best practice. Al has been gathering data from students here on which subjects they'd like to see developed next.

As part of our SDC, Global Challenges, researchers from Harvard Graduate School came in to work with students. Dr Christina Hinton, Ben Hill and Whitney Warren are supporting our students in becoming Junior Research Fellows. The students are designing activities to carry out with people who have some level of dementia and are seeking to understand whether they're able to have an impact on the well-being of those people and (by carrying out regular volunteer work) on themselves.

This half term, GCSEs were once again in the news; the system is too focused on a narrow set of metrics which don't include broader skills and attributes which employment demands.

KAS Society News: The Impact of your Subscription

It has been brought to my attention that some of our Society members might have missed the occasions when I detail what the Society does with money raised by your annual subscriptions. Let me give you an idea, based on what we have invested in this last year.

The Society Committee is responsible for how to use the funds and our remit is summarised as preserve, progress and promote.

Under 'progress' we spend money on educational research and under 'promote' we share our ideas and ideals with other schools and educators.

Last year we paid for a most successful conference in association with Rethinking Assessment which attracted some of the brightest minds in education today. We invested in the Next Big 10 programme with nine state schools to work together on new ideas and best practice. We have invested in a programme for our students facilitated by Harvard University on research techniques. We offer research grants to any of our own staff who develop a research project; currently a member of staff is working on the acquisition of higher order thinking skills in our 6-8 explorations. We put money into the production of a major book on The Village which will record forever what brought this project to fruition and describe the philosophy behind it. And now we are about to invest in mounting a TEDx event in January 2024.

I thank you for your subscriptions and I hope you will agree that the money is well spent. I am so glad you are members and hope you will continue your interest in our Society activities long after your children have grown up!











