
Art, Music & Drama




Year 8 and 9 Finding Their Way and Throwing Some Clay

Children's Mental Health Week

This year, Children's Mental Health Week took place from Monday 5 to Friday 9 February with the theme My Voice Matters. The School ensures, throughout the year, that our students feel their voices are being heard through different forums such as School Six (involving Sixth Form representatives), Pupil Council (Lower School, Year 3 upwards) and Student Voice (Upper School).

Children's Mental Health Week is a great opportunity to further highlight to our students just how important it is to look after your mental health. The week began with a Callover for Year 7, given by Heidi in Year 12 who is a member of School Six. Heidi spoke to them about what they could do to support their own mental wellbeing, discussed the stigma surrounding mental health issues and how someone struggling with their mental health may not show it.

There were several speakers welcomed across our year groups. Year 11 had a talk on sleep by Dr Irshaad Ebrahim, Year 12 heard from *The Roots Programme* and Year 13 listened to *Solutions Not Sides*.

During Form Hour, students in Years 6-8 participated in a number of wellbeing activities which took place all over Manor Wood. There was Lego building and bead jewellery making in the 6-8 Building; campfire and singing at the back of the amphitheatre; shirt tie-dye and nail painting on the Science floor; music band and dancing on the Drama and

Music floor, as well as wood whittling in the Middle School common room and crystal singing bowls in one of the Year 6 classrooms.

It was a brilliant week of highlighting how important it is to look after your mental health and to take time to do the things that you enjoy most.

The Edge Foundation, The Heads'

Assessment. As well as hosting a
standing room only breakout
session on School Directed
Courses, we also launched our
own research paper:

A Review of Assessment Methods in Higher Education, which backs our calls for GCSEs to move away from a mono-focus on end of year timed exams. Head, Robert, said: "This review lays bare the worrying divide between the ways in which schools and universities assess their students. Schools need to be freed from the limitations of the current exam system so they can introduce more effective methods of assessment that better reflect what will be asked of their students, not just at university but in the workplace too."

Flipping Pancakes for Science

Year 7 have been looking at variables in Science. They focused on how the volume of water added to pancake mixture affects the diameter of a pancake. They planned their practical carefully and ensured all the other variables were kept constant so they could draw a valid conclusion. Their findings showed the more water added, the greater the diameter. One clear advantage of this experiment was that it was edible at the end.

(All necessary precautions were taken to ensure that the pancakes were safe to eat.)



Walking through the History of the Stuart Dynasty


Our A level History students took a walking tour around London before the end of term.

these memories and bring to life how a KAS education influenced decisions and paths taken.



Richard Oblath delivered a Connections Series talk to Sixth Form during Form Hour this half term. Richard is a second-generation OA - his mother Gerda attended KAS as a refugee in 1937. Richard spoke about his career path as a scientist implementing sustainable energy plans within big oil. His work has been so important in the fight against climate change, and Richard has sat across the table from world leaders, activists, and corporate executives to bring the science to the forefront of enacting carbon neutral strategies.

He encouraged students to use their voices and to consider this as a career path for the scientifically minded.

One thing was evident - once an Alfredian, always an Alfredian!






Old Alfredian Lunch
