Diana visited KAS just before the Easter break to spend some time in the KAS archives. Diana was kind enough to submit some photos from her personal albums of her time at the School. Her father, the late Gene Shelley, was a bursar at KAS during Diana's time here. Throughout the years, Gene took beautiful photographs, capturing the playful, creative memories of the King Alfred School from the late 1940s through the 1950s. Among his photos is one (bottom right) that

shows KAS children acting in a play written by Diana Shelley in 1948, The Girl who Wandered Through the Woods. The children performed this in what was called the open-air theatre, now known as the Amphitheatre. Another of his photos (below left) is also in the Amphitheatre but from the 1950s. Diana is first on the left and in the back, holding the heart, is Lucy Moy Thomas (OA 1962) playing Cupid. Lucy remembers that "the red paint rubbed off onto everything!"

Hospital Rooms. The programme brings artistled digital workshops and free art materials to every NHS patient mental health site in England. Sara appeared in a reel promoting the exhibition in which she emphasised the

importance of art in our lives: "Hospital Rooms is really important. We need art in hidden spaces. When people are really unwell and go into hospitals and care centres, there's this idea that you will be going somewhere... hidden spaces. But Hospital Rooms means we are bringing in something for you. We are not expecting you to go away and hide, disappear away from the world. It empowers people to create their own piece of art. I think without art there is no humanity. If we don't have an appreciation for the arts, we will lose our humanity."

#### Jocelyn Ryder-Smith (OA 1958)





## Kate Williams (née Catherine Elliot, OA 1973)


Kate will release her children's poetry book in time for the holidays.





When you look back at the history of the school, we have always been ahead of the curve on the role of women. The driving forces behind the school were two formidable Victorians - Isabel White Wallace and Alice Mullins, the school was opened by the champion of Women's Suffrage Millicent Fawcett, and there are striking photos in the archives of gender-neutral cricket in the 1930s.

One of the ways this past has been brought into the present is through our three boats, named after King Alfred's daughters, Æthelflæd, Ælfthryth and Æthelgifu. Æthelflæd occasionally peeks through in the history books. Married off to the King of the Mercia in order to secure a Wessex/Mercia alliance, she was a shrewd operator sometimes compared to Elizabeth I. For similar reasons, Ælfthryth was married to the Count of Flanders, whilst Æthelgifu became the founding abbess of Shaftesbury. All were tutored from an early age and represent Alfred's commitment to education and a progressive view of the world.

On Saturday 21st September, the same day as the OA Reunion, the memory of these three Anglo-Saxons was honoured as our three boats bearing their names rowed down the Thames in 'The Great River Race'. Crewed by our Year 12s and Year 13s, they joined hundreds of other crafts from around the world for 22 miles from Millwall in the East to Richmond in the West.

It is undoubtedly by rowing in the same direction that we do the best by the KAS children.

These boats were built by staff, parents and students (who of course, are now Old Alfredians) working together, and this always serves as an apt metaphor for our community. At times, it is this relationship which helps us all stay afloat, and at times it is this relationship which enables us to glide effortlessly over the water. As we all recognise, it is undoubtedly by rowing in the same direction that we do the best by the KAS children.

This year, our collective efforts have helped set the course for our most recent OAs, with our KAS students having embarked on their new journeys in places far and wide. Equipped with strong A-level performance, the range of journeys was huge, and it is only possible to mention a few examples (forthcoming), but first we must celebrate our students outstanding results at both GCSE and A-level.

At GCSE, 55% were at grade 7 or above [the old A grade]. This is well over double the national average [22%] and well above the Independent School average [48%]. 94% were at Grade 4 or above [the old C grade], which again compares very favourably to the National and Independent School picture. A key metric for us is our 'value-added' [VA] score, which shows how well students do in relation to their starting point. We were delighted to see that was very positive [+ 0.4] and our second highest VA score on record.

At A-level, 58% of grades were A/A\* which is over double the National picture [24%] and comfortably above the Independent School average [49%]. A quarter of all grades were A\*, 4 out 5 were A\* - B, and there was a 99% pass rate. At A-level, our value-added score was in the top 7% of schools nationally as well as in the top 7% of Independent Schools.

In terms of different paths taken for our recent leavers, in Science, we have students studying Chemistry at Imperial [recently ranked the number 2 university in the world], Natural Sciences at Durham, and Computer Sciences in York and London. In the Humanities, they have launched into Geography at Exeter and Criminology at Loughborough, History at Warwick and PPE at Edinburgh. In Economics and Maths, Alfredians will be studying at Exeter, Bath, Leeds and Manchester. In the Arts, courses include Drama at Bristol, Film Practice at UAL and Fine Arts at Leeds. And to underline the variety, other degrees include Fashion, Nursing, Music Technology and Creative Writing.

The non-university route is also significant. Our students have gained places at the top national Art Colleges and will use this as a springboard to further study. Others will be starting at prestigious Drama schools, which is a highly impressive achievement straight out of school.

Special mention must also go to our three refugee Ukrainian students, all of whom have gone on to secure excellent places for next year.

One of the hallmarks of KAS is that we support each individual to find the right course at the right place for them. We do not say that one thing is better or worse than another – rather the real value lies in whether is going to challenge, inspire and fulfil that young person over the next few years. I am very proud of this group of young people, and hope that the foundations we have given them will serve them well for their next chapter.

As we look back on our rich history and the impact of figures like Alfred's daughters, it's clear that contribution and collaboration have long been at the heart of our ethos. Just as these women shaped their world, our alumni can help shape the future by supporting and inspiring our students today. Whether through mentorship, sharing expertise, or engaging with our KAS community, your involvement breathes life into our values and helps guide the next generation of Old Alfredians. As evident through your contributions to Alfredian Voices: What I REALLY Learnt at School Podcast, as well as your participation as speakers in our Connections Series, we continue the legacy of supporting our KAS community and creating a more forwardthinking society — both within and beyond the KAS gates.




#### Alfredian Voices podcast





Celebrating our **President** 

#### Margaret Young, 1932-1979

Margaret Young (nee Hughes, OA 1951) was a student at The King Alfred School 1937-39, as a five to seven year old. Her brother, Arthur Hughes, wrote from New York to share details of Margaret's life, including this obituary. It is edited from the original written by Arlene Blum for The American Alpine Club.

Margaret Young, an AAC member since 1973, died of cancer on June 17, 1979, after a 27-year mountaineering career including climbs in the U.S.A., Canada, Mexico, Ecuador, Bolivia, Kenya, Iran, Afghanistan, Russia, Nepal, and England. Among her first ascents were Monja Grande in Ecuador, and the south summit of the Moose's Tooth in Alaska.

She made numerous first ascents and first winter ascents of peaks and rock climbs in the Sierra Nevada, and first and last ascents of rock routes in the Glen Canyon area of Arizona (last because the routes are now covered by the waters of Lake Powell). She delighted in making first descents, for example the first descent from Upper to Lower Yosemite Falls by rope and rubber raft.

Margaret made a major contribution to the development of women's climbing. In 1970 she was a member of the first all-women's team to climb Mount McKinley. In 1972 she reached the summit of Noshaq in Afghanistan, and with Alice Liska shared the altitude record for women from the Western Hemisphere. Among her climbs with Vera Watson, her frequent climbing partner, were Mount Robson, first ascents of two peaks on the Grueningk Glacier, the first all-women's ascent in winter of Pigeon and Howser Spires, and in 1977 the first all-women's ascent of Sajama (21,424 ft), the highest peak in Bolivia. Of all her peak climbs, Monja Grande in Ecuador was her favourite.

She brought her analytical skills to bear on her favourite activities — climbing, flying, caving and hang gliding — accepting inherent risks and proceeding with maximum control and safety. A superb photographer, she made stereo pairs of peaks and climbing routes for scientific study and planning climbs. Less widely-known are her sensitive photographs of the minutiae of the mountain world: small flowers, mineral crystals, knotty wood.

In August 1977, Margaret was thrown from a horse and paralysed, but she maintained an extraordinary level of activity. Having time to devote to her longtime interest in solar energy, she designed a solar heating system for use in her home. In the fall of 1978 she was a member of the National Science Foundation's panel on science and the handicapped. She contributed to the American Women's Annapurna I Expedition by making concentrated wine by a process she had invented, as well as pickets, flukes, cable ladders, etc.

In her last years Margaret had many cruel blows — paralysis, the loss of her friend Vera Watson, and finally cancer — but she treated them calmly and matter-of-factly. Margaret had rare imagination and determination — truly a unique woman, an innovative climber, and an inspiring friend.

Margaret clearly led a remarkable life and, like many Old Alfredians, was curious, intrepid and brave.

#### Jean Pappworth, 1923-2016

"My mother, Jean Pappworth (née Goldberg, OA 1941) was a King Alfred pupil during the 1930s. She loved her years there and they left an indelible mark on who she was. I am writing about her. She was a woman both remarkable and of her time and place, her life having interacted with Anna Freud, the Hampstead Jewish refugee community, and many local

artists. At King Alfred, she met people with whom she maintained friendships for her entire life. The school's ethos and creative energy were influential in who she became: an artist, and a lover of the English landscape and the outdoors...
