#### Smart(phone) advice for parents

The King Alfred School and KASparents were thrilled to welcome UCL professor **Dr Kaitlyn Regehr** in late November to discuss how to navigate the dangers of smartphones for children.

Hosted by **Dermot O'Leary**, the hourlong talk tapped into many parents' fears about the rapid rise of issues associated with smartphones and social media problems that, as Dr Regehr pointed out, parents have never previously navigated.

Some of the worrying facts to emerge from the session included:

- 88% of children watch YouTube, according to <u>Ofcom</u> – a completely unregulated platform;
- The amount of misogyny fed to young boys after one week of using TikTok increased four-fold, according to Dr Regehr's research;
- TikTok's algorithm becomes addictive within just 35 minutes of use, according to recently leaked <u>internal documents;</u>
- 27% of children have seen online pornography by age 11, rising to half of children by age 13, and that content is increasingly violent – as per last year's <u>Children's Commissioner report</u>.





Whilst these stats make for stark reading, Dr Regehr was full of helpful and practical advice for parents. Her top tips included:

 Understand your own and your children's screen usage and consumption habits – both qualitatively and quantitatively;

2. Proactively manage smartphone use;

3. Discuss healthy versus unhealthy screen time and consumption with your children;

- 4. Teach critical thinking skills;
- 5. Aim for more 'interactive screentime';
- 6. Encourage a digital spring clean.

- How we share best practices with likeminded schools through **Big** Education's Next Big 10 group.

#### Looking ahead to GCSE & A levels

It might seem a long way off, but for students in Years 9 and 11, support for next-step planning has already begun.

Year 9 parents enjoyed a webinar this term about <u>Year 10 & 11 Options</u> (see your messages in the Parent Portal to rewatch it) and students will have their January Form Hour sessions dedicated to helping them make the right choices.

In addition, subject teachers will be talking to students about what their GCSE or School Directed Course entails and giving individualised advice. Full details of our courses can be found in the Options Booklet or <u>on our website</u>.

Meanwhile, Year 11 students had various opportunities to look ahead to Sixth Form this term. At our Sixth Form Open Events they spoke to subject specialist teachers about A level courses and current Sixth Formers shared their own experiences of the individualised learning on offer.



New Head of Sixth Form **Eleanor Mitchell-Webb** has held informal dropins to answer questions from Year 11s, as well as running a workshop in which they considered the different factors that might filter into their Sixth Form decisionmaking process.







Of pulling off the show in just 10 short weeks, Rob said: "It's quite exceptional to be a part of The King Alfred School, where creative exploration is so actively encouraged."

The titular role was played by **Tabitha N-L** (Year 12), who called the experience "magical".

"I feel very lucky to have been a part of 'The Ballad of Raggedy Alice'. There was so much trust and freedom in the project from all angles. Finding the hidden quirks behind the lines was an unforgettable experience.

### CHOICE, EXPLORATIONS & GLOBAL CHALLENGES

#### **Explorations in Year 7**

This term's enquiry question: How can we live on a deserted island?

This term's Exploration provided Year 7 students with an engaging, interdisciplinary learning experience, culminating in a survival exhibition that showcased practical skills, maps, and creative work.

Students explored survival through the lens of various subjects. In Humanities they learned about Maslow's hierarchy of needs and analysed the difference between surviving and thriving.

Meanwhile, in Geography and Maths they developed map skills including scales, coordinates and contours, and studied how latitude influenced forest types and the plants and animals within them.

In Science, students engaged in practical activities like fire-making, water filtration, creating natural toothpaste, and dissecting fish to understand survival at a biological level.

The design component focused on building strong shelters and creating art using natural materials, fostering both functionality and creativity.

Throughout, students built skills in creative thinking, communication, and collaboration as they worked together to solve survival challenges, present their journey through maps and writing, and create innovative solutions to thrive on the island. The project wove academic knowledge with hands-on learning, offering students an immersive way to understand survival.



#### **Explorations in Year 8**

### This term's enquiry question: How can we tackle health inequality?

This term, Year 8 students embarked on a deep learning journey in their Exploration. This interdisciplinary study provided a rich opportunity for students to develop their communication, collaboration and creative thinking skills while addressing a pressing global issue.

The Exploration began with a guest lecture by **Lauren Mustarde**, a lecturer at Imperial College, who introduced students to the factors contributing to health inequalities globally and in the UK.

Across subjects, students examined health inequality from various perspectives. In Science, they explored historical advancements that have raised public health standards and reduced inequality. In Geography, they investigated why some countries are more developed than others and how these disparities impact health outcomes. In English, sessions focused on the influence of media bias and stereotypes on perceptions of health, while in Maths students learned to calculate economic indicators of development and evaluate graphs and data to understand healthrelated disparities.



Building on this foundation, students applied their learning to write a detailed case study on the causes, impacts, and responses to the cholera crisis in Yemen. This task deepened their understanding of global health challenges while honing their independent research and critical thinking skills. They analysed detailed evidence, evaluated responses to the crisis, and proposed solutions, justifying their ideas with logic and evidence.

Through this Exploration, students gained a comprehensive understanding of health inequality and the tools to think critically about addressing it.

#### A terrific term for Choice

This term, Friday afternoons in Upper School have been more energetic and lively than ever before, with our weekly Choice cocurricular activities bringing students from Years 7 to 12 together for the first time.

This unlocked new opportunities for even more teachers to get involved in running their own Choice options. Roaming around school on any given Friday afternoon, you'd see children learning Japanese, building radio-controlled cars and mastering photography skills, to name but a few of the incredible activities on offer.

In the culinary realm, they whipped up everything from curries to crumbles. Over in the school's forge, students turned >>>

>>> their hand to blacksmithing, bending bolts and bracelets. Sports enthusiasts were thrilled to train with our expert coaches, **Chris** and **Jazzi**, for basketball and football.


Meanwhile, sewing teacher **Brianna** helped students to handmake skirts and purses. **Stelios** introduced the art of jewellery making, including crafting rings out of silver and wax. And film buffs enjoyed sessions with **Nuray**, who imparted A level Film Studies techniques to younger students.

We were also excited to finally bring Year 7 and 8 into the Photography darkroom, sharing our fantastic facilities with the younger students. Head of Computer Science **Saurabh** has been guiding students through Photoshop, and will continue with game design and coding sessions next term.

Our sports team launched the Young Leaders Sports Qualification with Year 8 and 9 (see next page), empowering our children to lead their own activities . Our singers, dancers, musicians, and actors were rehearsing for the fabulous Upper School show, 'The Ballad of Raggedy Alice'. Upstairs in Art, students delved into sketchbook work, printmaking, and clay modelling. Students learnt about probabilities through board games with **Pany**, and Yoga provided welcome opportunities for some to unwind.

Next half-term promises even more exciting Choice options on offer, including Dungeons and Dragons, life skills, meditation and Buddhism, classics, bicycle maintenance, and money matters.

A heartfelt thank you to our dedicated staff for offering these incredible opportunities and to our students for embracing them with open minds.

Students were assessed on their use of verbal and nonverbal communication; demonstrating active listening and questioning; using motivational methods through praise and targets to challenge students; effective organisation when planning and changing their session; and adapting a session to cater for participants' needs.



We are incredibly proud of this group, made up of **Elijah B, Panos C, Harry M, Marnie E-O, Lola W, Sierra K, Penny F, Eden P** and **Summer P**. They delivered each point with fantastic energy, and certainly ticked the 'three Cs' from our illustrious wheel. Congratulations on your tremendous work!

Five of these students (Elijah, Panos, Harry, Marnie and Summer) and Level 3 Sports Leader **Luca W** (Year 13) also attended Barnet Bar No One at Hendon Leisure Centre, an event that supports children with SEN in Barnet to get active.



Our Sports Leaders were tasked with assisting two of the eight activity stations. They quickly got to grips with two new sports (boccia and golf) and helped to lead activities for a wide variety of children with special education needs, including those with profound and multiple learning disabilities. It was incredible to see them thrive and adapt under pressure – the learning zone sweet spot!

West Barnet coordinator **Caroline Connell** said: "For their first experience at a BBN1, they [the KAS students] did a fantastic job. They all listened brilliantly and got stuck in with the stations. The schools who attended were very impressed with how involved they were, and the coaches relished their support.

"Please pass on our thanks, without their extra help we cannot offer these opportunities to the pupils of Barnet."


#### Interform competition kicks off

#### Spanish on the big screen

Year 12 & 13 Spanish students attended an inspiring Spanish study day at the British Film Institute (BFI). The event provided a unique opportunity to delve into the life and works of the celebrated Spanish poet and playwright **Federico García Lorca**.

The morning session was led by **Prof. Sarah Wright** from Royal Holloway, **Dr. Miguel García López** from the University of Bristol, and **Dr. Mari Bastianes** from the Universidad Complutense de Madrid. Through a combination of interactive discussions in Spanish and audiovisual resources, students explored Lorca's impact on Spanish literature and culture. Themes such as tradition, gender roles, and repression were analysed in the context of his work.



In the afternoon, students enjoyed a screening of 'La Casa de Bernarda Alba', one of Lorca's most iconic plays and a key text for their A level exams.

"It was an unforgettable experience," said Year 13 student **Romily G**. "Hearing expert insights and being immersed in the Spanish language helped us connect with Lorca's work in a completely new way."



#### Flipping good festive fun

For the last Choice session of the term, Years 9-11 headed off site to take part in fun group activities. These outings are a great way for students to get to know people who aren't in their Forms, and to build bonds within the year group.

#### Paris Photo: always good ideas

A group of KAS Sixth Form students journeyed across the channel in November for the Photography department's annual pilgrimage to **Paris Photo**, an international photography fair held at the city's magnificent Grand Palais. Among them was **Clemmie W (Year 13)**, who was attending for the second year.

#### What did you enjoy most about the trip?

"The exhibition features many types of photography, so it was a huge source of inspiration for my A level personal investigation project. I'm currently looking at Polaroids and there was a whole section dedicated to <u>Polaroid x Magnum</u>, a partnership celebrating instant photography, so I took a lot of inspiration from that.

"It's also fantastic to have the opportunity to talk to working artists and those who work in the industry. I spoke to a few people this year about their experience of working in a gallery, which I'm interested in doing when I'm older."

### Did the trip help you think about your future?

"Yes, it did. I don't necessarily want to be a photographer or an artist, but I still want to work in a creative environment – perhaps as a curator at a gallery like the Gagosian or White Cube. [Head of Photography] **Cliff** has given me lots of opportunities to experience that through the exhibitions we've hosted at school, but this trip gave me the chance to explore that side of the industry in more detail – for example, looking at how the galleries were laid out."

#### "Ypres trip changed my understanding of the War"

Every November, Year 9 students spend two days visiting World War I sites in Belgium as part of their History studies.

Head of History and Politics **Leon** has led the trip for many years. He said: "The visit to Belgium really supports our teaching about the First World War in the Autumn term, but on a holistic level it also inspires important reflections on the sacrifices and hardships of conflict and warfare."

Student **Elliot** found the trip challenged his viewpoint: "As I looked out at what

had been no man's land, I reflected on the huge tragedy that this war was. In just 24 hours, my idea of war had been changed and it seemed no longer like a thing of glory and honour, but a thing that must be avoided. I don't think I'll forget this trip anytime soon, so thank you."

**Troy S** reflected on the importance of the visit: "It certainly helps to cement the subject in your mind when you visit a place, so it helps you to learn."

Head Teacher **Robert** also joined our lovely group of Honorary Members, Life Members, KAS Friends and Past Parents.


We all enjoyed a thoughtful discussion on the latest KAS news, with a particular focus on psychology and the well-being of our students.
