Earlier in the week, students embraced their playful side, dressing as Minions for a water fight (that saw Lynne get a soaking!) and enjoying a paintballing trip.













Year 8 prepare for The Village 2025

Year 8 students have begun preparations for their Village experience in the second half of Summer Term. This KAS rite of passage will see them live in the school's grounds for a week and govern their own community, supported by teachers.

As part of their prep, they have explored the importance of meeting in a Socratic circle. As one student explained, this means that "everyone is on the same level and therefore equal; there is no hierarchy. On a practical level, it also means that we can all see each other."



Chemists enjoy fruits of their work

This term, Year 10 Triple Award chemists learnt about esters as part of their organic chemistry topic. Esters are organic compounds formed



from a reaction between a carboxylic acid and an alcohol, which gives fruits their characteristic smell.

Students had the chance to create their own esters, mixing different types of the two substances to produce a variety of fruity scents.



This is one of the core **Triple Award Science** practicals, and finishes off the section on organic chemistry.

Rising to the (maths) challenge

We continued to give Years 7 & 8 students a taste of exam formality by participating in the **UKMT** Junior Maths Challenge for the second year running.



As ever, students rose to the challenge, with lots of time spent practising in the run-up to the event.

When the results arrived, teachers gathered each year group outside at Squirrel Hall to celebrate the students who had been awarded bronze, silver and gold certificates, to loud cheers from their classmates.

The results will be published in the upcoming edition of *The Alfredian*, marking another bumper year. Well done to all!

KAS takes to the TEDx stage

Students, parents, teachers and Old Alfredians took to the Main Hall stage this term to share thoughts and ideas at the fifth iteration of **TEDxKingAlfredSchool**.

Each of the 15 speakers was allotted five minutes to talk from memory on a topic they feel passionately about. This year, subjects ranged from science and sociology to personal passions and wry observations.

A culmination of many weeks' hard work spent writing, refining and rehearsing the talks – a process that pushed participants out of their comfort zone and developed a range of skills.

Year 12 student **Lily R**, who spoke about the notion of 'pretty privilege', said: "I want to be a film director when I'm older, so the skills I've learnt here will be useful for pitching ideas. Because the talk is only five minutes, you really have to refine what you want to say; it's hard!"

Lower School teacher **Natalie Petzal** spoke movingly about her relationship with her brother. Enjoying a well-deserved cup of tea afterwards, she said: "It was really amazing watching everyone's reaction. I've been overwhelmed by the number of people who have shared their own stories with me."

Organiser **Kara Conti** presented all the speakers with the now-traditional TEDx mug after the event. She said: "I was so impressed by everyone's calm bravery. All their hours of hard work, writing and memorising truly paid off. The support they gave each other was heartwarming, and the sense of achievement will be lasting."

Well done to both groups for their performances.




KAS 'gathers' for GCSE Art show

Right on Kew

Year 7 made the most of the May sunshine on a recent trip to **Kew Gardens** to get inspiration for their **Exploration** enquiry, 'How can we redesign the Middle School Common Room?'

Students spent half of the day exploring Kew's glorious grounds. Highlights included The Hive, a 17-metre installation in a wildflower meadow (where some students held an impromptu yoga session!), and the Treetop Walkway, which offered fantastic views across London and a different perspective on the surrounding foliage.

They also enjoyed an educational session with one of Kew's on-site teachers, who shared many interesting facts – such as the site holding a Guinness World Record for the largest collection of living plants at a single-site botanic garden.

The session introduced students to some of Kew's magnificent buildings, including the Temperate House, Palm House and Princess of Wales Conservatory. They discussed elements of the buildings' designs and why they were suited to the plants they housed.

Students also spent some time sketching the structures and some of the plants, and conceiving their own designs. They will use their learnings to inform their Middle School Common Room project.

Student **Lev F** said: "I liked that as a group we had the choice of where to go and what to see. It was also interesting to consider the buildings and understand more about the design process."

DofE: Year 10's Silver expedition

This term, intrepid Year 10s headed to the Peak District National Park for their **Duke** of Edinburgh Silver Award expedition.

Students stayed in a hostel on their first night before setting out on a three-day hike, staying at campsites for the remainder of the trip.

Working in small groups, they used maps and compasses to plan and navigate their routes. Along the way, they encountered peacocks and lambs, stunning scenery, and rivers in which they cooled their weary feet.

The trip also presented plenty of opportunities to learn new skills, such as relationship building, teamwork and conflict resolution.

"My group was made up of people I wouldn't usually see outside of school, so it was a good opportunity to get closer to them," shared **Polly H**.

"When we had disagreements, we listened to both sides and took a vote on which one most people agreed with," said **Alia G-B**.

DofE: Year 9's Bronze expedition

Some 31 Year 9 students completed a two-day self-guided expedition as part of their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award over a weekend in late April.

Planning their route through the beautiful New Forest and carrying all of their kit, the students had to navigate, problemsolve, cook and manage their time in this character-building challenge.

The challenging expedition taught students many vital life lessons, as Mollie O explained: "I felt that I gained independence and resilience. You know that if you give up and sit down, you're impacting your whole team. When difficult things happened, we had to pull together."

Scarlett S added: "When the assessor asked each of us what we'd contributed to the group, we could see how we'd all made it work as a team. It gave me a great sense of achievement."

Cara M-S summed the experience up beautifully: "In the moment, it feels difficult or tiring, but you come away with such positive memories. I had an amazing time."



Physicists power up their learning

As part of their A level **Physics** studies, Sixth Formers took a trip to the Culham Centre for Fusion Energy in Oxfordshire. "It's a centre where they test equipment, train staff and conduct research into nuclear energy," explained Django S. Students saw a decommissioned reactor and a model used for training purposes. Jimmy B said: "I enjoyed seeing the huge mechanised robot arm that they use inside the reactor - it's such a powerful tool."

It was deeply moving to see so many of you — Old Alfredians, former and current staff, and members of the wider KAS community — gather in the Main Hall and on the field to honour John's memory. Your presence, stories and warmth helped create a truly special evening, filled with memories of John, our kindhearted trailblazer – a brilliant and benevolent force.

Every moment was made more meaningful by the community that surrounded him throughout his life; from the display of John's cherished boats and the unveiling of a bench in his name, to the collection of photos everyone helped gather and all the words shared.

"I've been to many reunion events where alumni share the impact that former teachers had on their lives," shared our Development Director, **Tamlyn Worrall**. "Rarely have the stories been as varied and as heartwarming as those told by our Old Alfredians in memory of John, who taught at the school for 37 years.


