Oar-some KAS crews row 21 miles

An early morning start and strong teamwork paid off for KAS Sixth Formers, who triumphed over their KAS competitors in a 21.6-mile rowing race up the Thames.

Three KAS crews — students, staff and parents — rowed from Millwall to Richmond in the Great River Race, among 300 boats. They used the school's boats, Æthelflæd, Æthelgifu, and Ælfthryth, named after King Alfred's daughters.

"It was an opportunity to do something different," said Sixth Former **Jimmy B**. "The 7:30 am start did make me wonder, 'Why am I here!?' But at home, I would just have been asleep in bed, so it was better to be doing something. It's there to be done, after all!"

Jimmy rowed with two close friends, two younger students, and KAS teacher **Julian**. The team rotated roles and took snack breaks to stay energised and in sync. And their efforts paid off: the student boat reached Richmond two minutes ahead of the teachers and five minutes ahead of the staff!

The atmosphere was a mix of focus and fun. "Half the participants were professional athletes, then in the other half, you've got people dressed as parrots," Jimmy laughed. But for him, it was more than just a race: "It's quite meditative when you get into the swing of it."

Well done to all who took part and represented KAS so wonderfully — proving what teamwork, spirit, and an early alarm can achieve!

Buzzing for books


Year 7 students are buzzing after being treated to a new book!

Year 8's terrific terrariums!

Year 8 got their hands dirty in a recent Science lesson where they made terrariums.

Students gathered soil from nearby Hampstead Heath and moss from around the school grounds. Back in the classroom, they learned about the important role that water, oxygen and carbon dioxide play in helping the miniecosystems thrive.

"It's science, but fun science!" said **Emma M**. Meanwhile, **Mylo C** found the creativity in the project: "It was really satisfying placing the moss and seeing it take shape."

The project was part of their STEM Exploration topic on 'Systems'.







Surviving (and thriving!) in Year 7



Year 7 students have been tackling the challenge of survival in their 'Surviving and Thriving on a Desert Island' project.

They began with a quick-fire task: building a spaghetti structure strong

enough to hold a marshmallow. Then, with DT and Forest School teacher Chris Raymond, they headed to the woods to construct a full-class shelter using only natural materials.

These activities have tested their ability to think creatively, work collaboratively and communicate effectively. They are now making mini prototypes ahead of building their own shelters in the Amphitheatre that must be stable, waterproof and warm.

Throughout the STEM Exploration, students will learn not just how to survive but also thrive in the wilderness.

SPORT

Netball season so far...

It's been a busy and exciting term for KAS netball, with teams showing skill, resilience and great sportsmanship across multiple fixtures.

Year 9 (pictured right) and Year 10 faced tough competition against CCF, with final scores of 20–26 and 7–18. Despite the losses, both teams displayed strong teamwork and determination. They later bounced back with impressive wins against SMSJ: 16–0 (Year 9) and 12–1 (Year 10), highlighting excellent defence and sharp attacking play.

Elsewhere, our **Year 11** team competed in the ISA Netball Tournament at Abbotts Hill School, finishing eighth overall. Their performance reflected years of dedicated practice and provided valuable experience ahead of league fixtures.

Two Year 7 teams entered a separate tournament, which saw the As finish



third, a fantastic achievement for their first outing. Meanwhile, the Bs went all the way to the final – and brought home the plate, pictured above! Some brilliant interceptions and standout shooting were key in their success.

Well done to all of our netballers for their energy, teamwork and commitment!

Football focus

It's been a great term for boys' football across the school, with standout performances from multiple year groups.

Year 11 dominated the pitch, securing three consecutive wins, including a commanding 8–0 victory over Maida Vale School.

Meanwhile, **Year 10** showed resilience, drawing 5–5 with North Bridge House Senior Hampstead before clinching a 3–1 win against Highgate.

Year 9 impressed with a solid 3–0 win, while **Year 7** celebrated a 4–2 triumph over Highgate.

Despite a tough 2–15 loss for **Year 8** against St John's Senior, the spirit remained high. And our **Sixth Formers** faced a challenging match against CCF, ending in a 0–5 defeat.

Redecorating & resilience in Namibia

After completing their GCSEs in July, a group of Year 11 students swapped classrooms for the Namibian desert in a life-changing trip with **Elephant-Human Relations Aid (EHRA)**. The charity works to reduce conflict between wild elephants and local communities, promoting peaceful coexistence.

Students spent their first week volunteering in a village, repainting a classroom and bathroom. "It was hard work," said **Bea J-A**, now in Year 12, "but in the evenings we played football with the children and took lots of photos – they loved the cameras."

The trip, funded through student-led fundraising, supports EHRA's work and offers a chance to bond after exams. "The EHRA team were lovely," said **Alexia C-F**. "We all got on so well, singing while painting and chatting around the campfire."

In the second week, students learned tracking and navigation skills, culminating in a challenging self-guided trek. "We went off course and walked an extra 10km," Bea recalled, "but finishing it gave us a real sense of achievement."

The experience also offered new perspectives. "Seeing people live happily without the things we think we need was eye-opening," said Alexia.

The trip not only supported a vital cause but also helped students' personal growth. Many returned to Sixth Form in September with renewed confidence and lasting memories. "It definitely built that sense of 'I can do this', which we'll need for A levels," concluded Bea.















Biology field trip

Sixth Form biologists visited Flatford Mill in Suffolk this term to complete the ecology components of their A level **Biology** course.

Everyone engaged fully in the intensive three-day course, which saw them studying succession on the salt marshes at Holbrook Bay and habitat diversity in the woodlands. They also completed their own project using fieldwork techniques and statistical tests learnt during their time at Flatford.

Head of Science, **Phil Price**, said: "I'd like to publicly thank the pupils for their excellent behaviour and hard work throughout."







Year 12s invest in research



Last term, **Economics** A level students headed into the City as part of their studies.

Our student insider, **Ella R**, shared: "The Year 12 Economics trip to the Bank of England Museum was an interesting day that gave us a closer look at how the UK's central bank works.

"We started the day with a self-guided tour of the museum, where we learnt

about how banks have changed over time, as well as the Bank of England's history since its foundation in 1694, the evolution of bank notes, and the Bank's crucial role in maintaining financial stability. A particular highlight was the opportunity to lift a genuine gold bar, weighing around 13 kilograms!

"After the museum, we got to go on a walking tour of London, and we got to see very interesting buildings like the Lloyd's building, AKA the inside-out building. The next stop was Spitalfields Market where we had the opportunity to enjoy a wide range of food and soak up the atmosphere.

We also got the chance to visit Sky Garden, where we enjoyed views of London's financial district. This provided a unique perspective of the City of London, complementing the day's focus on finance and economics."

Artists in (their own) residence

For A level **Art** students, it's important to get out of the studio and to learn about artistic practice from working artists (as well as their fabulous teachers!)

This term, they were invited to visit the studios of **Idris Khan and Annie Morris**, where they spent time talking to them about their work.

"Seeing how artists work, exploring their creative spaces, and hearing about the context and journey behind their work is incredibly valuable," said **Rose F** (Year 13).

"It gives you a sense of freedom in your own practice – realising that art isn't rigid, that every artist works differently, and that even the things you might want to discard can hold meaning."







Forming ideas on AI at Bletchley

Year 7 students took an inspiring trip to **Bletchley Park**, the historic hub of Allied code-breaking during World War II, as part of their Liberal Arts Exploration titled 'Should We Fear or Embrace AI?'



Students immersed themselves in a dynamic exhibition showcasing the transformative power of artificial intelligence. They explored how AI is driving innovation across healthcare, environmental sustainability and the creative industries.

Highlights included hearing AI-generated versions of their own voices and participating in an engaging educational session on cybersecurity – bringing abstract concepts to life.

"This trip offered rich inspiration for students as they prepare to present their own perspectives in an end-of-project exhibition," said **Hannah Sheath**, Head of Interdisciplinary Projects.

Connections Talk: Amadeo Alentorn


