
Maths Club gets creative

Students at our weekly **Maths Club** embraced their inner artists this term. Working together, a group of Year 7s created a seasonal gingerbread scene using 72 Rubik's Cubes!

They followed a pattern set by Maths teacher **Sam Kirkwood**. It was based on a design submitted by **Ace B** and **Mateo R** (Year 12), and required one side of each cube to be in a precise formation. Their work was displayed in a custom frame built especially for the Maths department by DT and Forest School teacher **Chris Raymond**.

Earlier in the term, Year 7 student **Aviv C** impressively learned how to solve a Rubik's Cube in just three weekly sessions. "I've been waiting all week to come to Maths Club and finally finish it," he said proudly on the day of completion. "It feels great!"

Maths Club runs every Friday lunchtime for all Upper School students keen to try their hand at cube art, puzzles or problems.



Space to create and connect

More creative fun can be found at our weekly **Vintage Music and Arts Club**, which runs every Wednesday lunchtime.

The 'VM and A Club' provides a space for students to enjoy and discover music from the 60s and beyond, whilst making arts and crafts. It's a chance to connect with peers and enjoy a mindful moment.

Year 7s get crafty for a worthy cause

Five creative Year 7 students – **Hayley R, Eve A, Marlen M-A, Ola G and Reva N** – have folded an incredible 1,000 origami cranes as part of a charity project. They were inspired by the Japanese tradition of *Senbazuru*, which symbolises hope, healing, good fortune and peace.

The idea was sparked during a Callover and brought to life with support from Learning Support teacher **Simon Kerslake** at his Origami Club. Each crane is being sold for £1, with the team aiming to raise £1,000 for **Make-A-Wish**, a charity that grants life-changing wishes for children with critical illnesses.

Marlen explained: “This project was created to brighten the Christmas of young people who may be struggling, and to make their wishes come true.”

Published paper propels KAS Sixth Former towards a career in law

Please join us in congratulating **Rani G** (Year 12) on co-authoring a paper that has been published by **OxJournal**, an online academic platform for intellectually engaged young people.



Rani shared how it came about: “I was proudly selected as one of five participants for the four-week Oxford Scholastica Academy Commercial Law Internship. As part of this, I helped co-author a published paper that critically

evaluated the common law Spiliada test and its ability to adapt to the post-Brexit and digital environment.

“The project required me to manage and balance complex legal concepts from key cases like *Lubbe* and *AI Assam* alongside challenging geopolitical and commercial considerations.

“This analytical experience is vital to my university goal of studying International Relations, and my long-term aim of entering the legal profession through a conversion course.” [Read Rani’s article here!](#)

Year 9 volunteers do KAS proud

Please join us in saying a big well done to our Year 9 students who represented the school so wonderfully as volunteers at the recent **Barnet Bar No One (BBN1)** event.

Held at Hendon Leisure Centre, BBN1 gives primary school children with a range of SEN needs the opportunity to participate in different sports.

Eleven KAS students – some of whom are on our Sports Leaders programme – helped to run the event, either leading or supporting the delivery of activities including Boccia (a seated bowls game), NFL skills, and rugby with Saracens pros.

It was a demanding task, with the mini-lessons delivered in fast-paced eight-minute sessions – but our students rose to the challenge beautifully.

In the process, they developed what the organisers called “key employability skills” such as communication, teamwork, resilience, problem-solving, and adaptability – all core to the KAS ethos.

PE teacher **Victoria Stewart**, who co-ordinated KAS’s involvement, said: “Two of the professionals commented on how impressive our young people were.

Black History Month student discussion


Early this term, students from Years 10 to 13 took part in a panel discussion during Form Hour, to mark the end of **Black History Month (BHM)**.

After the discussion, the floor was opened up to students in the audience, who asked questions, including:

- Why are other ethnic groups excluded from BHM?
- Does KAS do enough to mark BHM?
- Would getting rid of BHM be giving in to racism?



The final few weeks of Autumn Term provided a lovely opportunity for everyone to come together.

















This year's Upper School show took over the re-vamped Phoenix Theatre for three nights this term, with a show-stopping production of ***Guys and Dolls***.





Cold-water swimmers make a splash!

Autumn Term saw eight courageous students join Maths teacher **Bettina Robbin-Coker** for an unforgettable cold-water swimming programme.

The group began by learning about the risks and benefits of this invigorating sport before taking their first dip at Parliament Hill Lido. At 19°C, the water felt refreshing – despite braving a sleet storm!

As the weeks passed and the temperature dropped to 17°C, the students were diving in with confidence. By the end of the term, they ventured to Hampstead Mixed Pond, where the water was a brisk 12°C. With no hot showers available, the group showed incredible resilience – armed with layers, hot water bottles, and the occasional hot chocolate.

Year 11 student **Mathew L** thoroughly enjoyed the experience, saying: “Cold-water swimming was the perfect way to start the weekend. I found that it helped me to relax after the school week.

“It really wakes you up and the feeling you get afterwards is amazing! I loved testing myself and becoming stronger.”

The students’ determination and enthusiasm were inspiring, and Bettina looks forward to welcoming more brave swimmers when cold-water swimming Choice returns in Summer Term 2026.

Choice is our Friday afternoon programme of co-curricular activities designed to help students try new things and develop skills beyond the curriculum.



Explorations outings and learnings

Year 7 Liberal Arts students have begun a thought-provoking **Exploration** this term: *'How should we commemorate events we are not proud of?'*

They have been tasked with designing a model to pitch as a new monument for the iconic **Fourth Plinth in Trafalgar Square**. Their designs will aim to commemorate slavery in a way that highlights resilience, resistance and positive advocacy.

For inspiration, students visited the Fourth Plinth to explore its existing statues and learn about the debates and controversies surrounding public monuments.

In class, they have been learning about the history of the slave trade, and heard from historian Paul Crooks, who spoke about Black British ancestry and identity.

Meanwhile, **Year 7 STEM** students have begun an engaging **Exploration**: *'Is space exploration ethical?'*

Students visited the **Science Museum** and learnt about the history of space exploration, and saw a demonstration on the physics of rockets.

In **Maths** they are learning how to calculate how far away planets are from stars (and therefore might have liquid water), in **Design** they are coding Mars rovers, and in **Science** they've been discovering the benefits to society achieved through research linked to space exploration.

Explorations are term-long projects in which students examine a compelling question or real-world problem from a variety of academic subject perspectives.

Students have their say on Marseille



"We arrived in Marseille on Thursday and met our tour guide outside the Town Hall in the Old Port. The building was built under Louis XIV, but, in protest, its architect refused to include a staircase – so even today the mayor enters through a neighbouring building! Bombing during WWII destroyed the area, with only the Town Hall and a draper's shop surviving. During reconstruction, workers uncovered a major archaeological find: an Ancient Greek ship.

"Walking along the port, we explored Marseille's traditions, from oyster farming to its famous soap industry. We also visited a former orphanage-turned-hospice and saw political graffiti showing how street art reflects local identity. Our tour ended at Marseille Cathedral and the Museum of European and Mediterranean Civilisations (Mucem), giving us a real sense of Marseille's past and present.

"On Friday, we joined a rap tour. Hip-hop came to France via US Marines trading tapes in Marseille, sparking a local scene. Early French rap was political and non-violent, but after a producer was killed by a right-wing militant, Marseille rap became more confrontational, reflecting community tensions. That evening, we enjoyed a fantastic rock concert.

"Saturday took us to Notre Dame de la Garde, a basilica overlooking the city. We rode a tourist train up the hill for stunning views. Later, we took a boat to Château d'If, the 16th-century fortress made famous in *The Count of Monte Cristo*. The day ended with an epic sunset."

Una C-M reflected on the scale and impact of the exhibition: "The exhibition was huge, so it was useful for seeing a wide variety of styles and techniques. It was very inspiring."

For **Bea J-A**, the trip offered more than just artistic insight: "It was a great trip because we got to see loads of Paris as well as all the amazing photography. It's useful to go to exhibitions when you're working on projects because it can help you make decisions about what you want to do with your own work. The trip was fun AND inspiring!"

The visit gave students the chance to immerse themselves in contemporary photography while exploring the cultural backdrop of Paris – a perfect blend of creativity and adventure.

Designing futures in Eindhoven

Our Year 12 and 13 **3D Design** and **Art** students recently headed to Eindhoven for **Dutch Design Week** – and it wasn't just a few exhibitions in one building. The whole city gets involved. Shops set up stalls, streets turn into galleries, and you can even stumble across striking architecture just walking down the road.

"Design is everywhere," said **Tommy D.** "You just walk down the road and see some weird architecture in the middle – it's absolutely everywhere."

The event is all about new designers and fresh ideas, with people coming from all over the world to showcase their work. For Tommy, the best part was seeing the design process up close and talking to the creators themselves – including students from the famous Dutch Design School showing off their final-year projects.

"It's really nice to see more European architecture and design," he explained. "It takes you out of the London bubble."

The trip gave Tommy plenty of inspiration for his own projects and a chance to see how design trends are evolving. It's also a reminder that design isn't just about the finished product – it's about the journey, the ideas and the conversations that make it happen.
